### Un nouvel hôpital de référence à Maseru, Lesotho

1 En janvier, le Gouvernement du Lesotho a entrepris l'acquisition d'un projet de remplacement  
2 de l'hôpital Queen Elizabeth II – un hôpital de référence national vieillissant – et de  
3 modernisation d'un réseau d'établissements de soins de santé primaires. Le 27 octobre 2008,  
4 il a signé un contrat avec Tšepong, un consortium dirigé par Netcare Hospital Group, un  
5 prestataire de services de soins de santé sud-africain afin de concevoir, construire, financer  
6 et exploiter un établissement de référence national de 425 lits (le Queen Mamohato  
7 Memorial Hospital – QMMH) et une clinique d'accès adjacente à l'hôpital. Le projet était  
8 censé également contribuer à rénover et rééquiper trois cliniques « annexes » urbaines, en  
9 l'occurrence Qoaling, Mabote et Likotsi.

10 Selon Tšepong, au moment du bouclage financier, le montant total des besoins de  
11 dépenses d'investissement du projet s'élevait à 1 164 000 541 M (104 438 millions de \$ EU).  
12 En retour, pour la fourniture des biens définis et la prestation d'une gamme complète de  
13 services cliniques dans l'hôpital, Tšepong devrait recevoir une « redevance unitaire » de l'État.  
14 Celle-ci est payable, une fois que les résultats stipulés dans le contrat sont obtenus  
15 conformément aux normes convenues. Des contrôleurs indépendants ont été nommés afin  
16 d'évaluer la qualité de la construction et des opérations, et des structures formelles établies  
17 par le contrat pour la supervision conjointe par Tšepong et l'État. Dans l'établissement, les  
18 soins sont prodigués aux patients gratuitement au lieu où ils sont traités, hormis une  
19 participation modeste pour certains services, qui s'élève, par exemple à 15 M (1,3 \$ EU) pour  
20 une extraction de dent ou pour une journée d'hospitalisation. En définitive, ces frais sont  
21 versés à l'État, bien que Tšepong retienne 10 % pour couvrir ses coûts administratifs.
